
### Social values of marine ecosystem services: Insights from multi-dimensional subjective well-being





How do these changes affect the well-being of the Baynes Sound social-ecological system?












#### Mixed Methods





Changes in the flow of ecosystem services have several domains or **dimensions** of effect on social well-being: environment, economy, and experience.




Perceptions about what matters about these effects on well-being are **variable**.

Perceptions about what matters about the effects of these changes are variable.

Changes or artifacts like aquaculture that modify the delivery of ecosystem services are experienced and **valued** differently.
